INVITED SPEAKER | Melanocyte Transplantation Plus Topical JAK Inhibitor or Tacrolimus for Treatment of Vitiligo: A Randomized Comparative Study

**Dr. Ahmed** is an internationally trained dermatology consultant who has made original contributions of major significance to the field. Her work has led to a greater understanding of surgical management of vitiligo and the immunological underpinnings for successful long-term surgical outcomes. She has successfully earned her clinical and translational PhD degree in dermatology, in surgical grafting of vitiligo, from the University of Massachusetts Medical School. Her areas of interest include procedural dermatology, Mohs surgery and laser. Dr. Ahmed's work has developed cutting-edge surgical treatments for patients with pigmentary skin disorders. Due to the significant impact of her work, she received the Skin of Color Society Research Grant Award, among other awards. Her original findings have appeared in leading, peer-reviewed journals in the field. Dr. Ahmed is an editorial reviewer for multiple national and international dermatology journals.

**Dr. Alexis** is the Vice-Chair for Diversity and Inclusion for the Department of Dermatology and Professor of Clinical Dermatology at Weill Cornell Medical College in New York City. He is the former Chair of the Department of Dermatology at Mount Sinai Morningside and Mount Sinai West. Having served as Director of the first-of-its-kind Skin of Color Center for over 15 years, his work has helped to advance patient care, research, and education pertaining to dermatologic disorders that are prevalent in populations with skin of color.



Dr. Alexis has published more than 100 articles in peer-reviewed journals including the British Journal of Dermatology, Journal of the American Academy of Dermatology, and JAMA Dermatology among others. He has co-edited two textbooks and authored over 10 book chapters. Dr. Alexis is a frequent lecturer at national and international conferences and has been invited as a Visiting Professor or Grand Rounds speaker at many prestigious academic institutions. He currently serves as President of the Skin of Color Society and is a member of the Board of Directors of the Scarring Alopecia Foundation.

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#### INVITED SPEAKER | SOCS Turns 20: Honoring Our Past, Imagining Our Future

**Dr. Barbosa** is an Associate Professor of Dermatology at the University of Chicago, where she directs the Hair Loss Program and leads Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion efforts in Dermatology. With expertise in alopecia and skin conditions in people of color, she is a renowned lecturer and author, co-editing a textbook on skin of color dermatology and co-authoring a skincare book. Previously, she held leadership roles at L'Oréal, including Vice President of Research and Development, establishing the L'Oréal Institute for Ethnic Hair and Skin Research. As founder of Millennium Park Dermatology, she was consistently named a Top Doctor by Chicago Magazine. Dr. Barbosa is dedicated to mentoring future physicians, serving on the Pritzker School of Medicine Admissions Committee and mentoring medical students and residents. She is President-Elect of the Skin of Color Society, Vice President of the Illinois Dermatological Society, and has held leadership positions in other dermatological organizations. Dr. Barbosa earned her B.A. from Harvard, M.D. cum laude from Yale, completed residencies at Yale and Johns Hopkins, and holds an M.P.H. from Johns Hopkins and an M.B.A. from

#### INVITED SPEAKER | Elucidating the Role of Autoantibodies in Hidradenitis Suppurativa

**Dr. Byrd** was born and raised in Edwards and Jackson, Mississippi. She obtained her BS ('04) from Tougaloo College in Tougaloo, Mississippi and MD,PhD ('16) from Warren Alpert Medical School of Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island. She completed an Ethnic Skin Postdoctoral Fellowship at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine (JHUSOM) under the direction of Dr. Ginette Okoye. Currently, she is an Associate Professor at Howard University College of Medicine and Adjunct Assistant Professor at JHUSOM (Departments of Dermatology) where her work centers on the establishment of tissue biobanks to understand the immunopathological mechanisms contributing to skin of color diseases, particularly among African-American patients with Hidradenitis suppurativa. Her main research focus is elucidating the unreported roles of neutrophils and the innate immunity in the induction of local and systemic immune dysregulation. Dr. Byrd leads multidisciplinary collaborative projects with the overarching goal of establishing a scientifically-driven approach to treatment options for patients suffering from these debilitating diseases. Of much importance, she continues to pay-it-forward along her journey devoting time to training and investing in the next generations of scientists and physician scientists as well as engaging in community outreach. She has contributed to the scientific literature, given numerous lectures, national/international talks, and has been featured on the BET 33rd Annual UNCF An Evening of Stars® international program, recognizing her as one who is "changing the face of science, one mind at a time."

**Dr. Desai** is a Diplomate of the American Board of Dermatology, and a Board Certified Dermatologist. He graduated with honors from Emory University. Following medical school, Dr. Desai completed his dermatology residency at The University of Alabama at Birmingham where he was Chief Resident.


